SOME THINGS TO KNOW BEFORE YOU GO OUT ON THE SNOW



BEFORE YOU GO

Research the area
you are going.

Obey caribou closures.

Follow the
Snowmobiler
Code of Ethics,
local club rules,
and any seasonal
riding restrictions.



WATCH FOR SIGNS

Wolverine tracks are
usually solitary and
far ranging, in a
2x2 or 3x3 pattern.

Wolverine dens are
deep holes in the snow
near treeline about
a ruler-length wide.

Caribou can be seen in
small groups and winter
high in the alpine.



BE AWARE

Ski and ride
responsibly.

Follow and obey
posted signs.

Prevent a wildlife
encounter by being
aware — reduce your
noise and tune your
eyes and ears.



THINGS TO KNOW

If you come across
an animal, STOP.

Don't approach
caribou or wolverine.

If riding, turn your
engine off, wait until
the animal has moved
on, then leave.

It's best to find another
area to ski or ride.
