Connecting and protecting habitat from Yellowstone to Yukon so people and nature can thrive.

An interconnected system of wild lands and waters stretching from Yellowstone to Yukon, harmonizing the needs of people and nature.

Why the Yellowstone to Yukon region matters

This incredible landscape is:

Wildlife-rich: Home to iconic species that have roamed here for thousands of years

Vital: The source of fresh, clean water for millions across North America

Unique: The world's most intact large mountain region

Vast: Spanning 1.3 million sq. km (502,000 sq. miles) — three times the size of California

- Bringing together diverse voices to create solutions that work for nature and people

Landscape protection

Guided by leading science and Indigenous knowledge, we work with partners to safeguard core habitats — critical for wildlife survival and thriving communities, especially as we experience a changing climate.



Landscape connection

We conserve and restore key wildlife movement corridors
— through wildlife crossings, restoration efforts, and voluntary private land conservation — ensuring animals can roam, breed, and survive across great distances.



Communities & conservation

We believe conservation succeeds when people are part of the solution. We collaborate on efforts with local communities — from wildlife-friendly ranching to managing recreation and reducing conflict with wildlife — building a future where both can flourish.
